# Standing Orders

- 1) The proposer of a Motion or an Amendment may speak for not more than five minutes when making the proposal. He/she may speak a second time and for not more than three minutes before a vote is taken.
- 2) A delegate seconding or speaking to a motion or an Amendment may speak once only and must not exceed three minutes. A maximum of two delegates from any one club shall speak on any one motion.
- 3) The Chairperson may, at any time they considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given, a vote must be taken.
- 4) A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairperson, move "that the question be put" after which, when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- 5) Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda except by the consent of the majority equal to two-thirds of those present and voting.
- 6) A speaker to the Secretary's Report or to any other general discussion shall not exceed three minutes on any one topic.

Máire Ní Foghlú outgoing Leinster Council Rep addressed convention on her role in Leinster and her time serving on Coiste Bainistí for the past 15 years as PRO and Assistant Secretary and thanked the many people who helped her over the years. Cathoirleach, Mícheál Martin expressed his appreciation on behalf of Coiste Bainstí and all delegates for the great service Máire has given to Wexford. Seosamh Ó Síocháin stated that there are serious issues accruing on our side-lines in regard to abuse towards referees from team mentors and officials, Seosamh reiterated that in a time where it is increasingly hard to recruit new referees this behaviour from our side-lines will not encourage members to take up the

whistle and it is an issue, he hopes that we will see a serious improvement in for 2022. Cathoirleach, Mícheál Martin stated this issue will be looked at seriously in the new year.

Daithí Tóibín (Safety and Facilities Officer) gave a brief outline for the planned upgrades of Chadwicks Wexford Park with the main works being the installing of Floodlights and associated works, irrigation system for the pitch, extension of dressing rooms, upgrading of the disabled and press areas. Daithí gave a breakdown of costs and timelines for the works outlined.

George Ní hEosa gave a presentation on the works of the Demographics taskforce and its findings. Cathoirleach thanked George and all his committee for their work which is of vital importance for our clubs going forward into the future and also stated that a full presentation will be presented to delegates at our February County Committee meeting.

The motion to amend the U18 Exception part of Bye Law 14 of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 was passed.

### Rúin 2022

Motions to remove or to amend an existing Bye-Law must be carried by three-fifths of those present, entitled to vote and voting. All other motions must be carried by a simple majority of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

#### Motion 1 (Coiste Contae)

That, Bye Law 17 of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended to the following:

#### 17. Age Grades

#### Adult:

A Player shall have celebrated their 18th birthday prior to January 1st of the Championship Year.

#### **Under Age Grades:**

In both hurling and football, league-based championships shall be organised for the following age grades:

#### Under 18:

To be structured on a divisional basis with at least Premier, Roinn 1 and Roinn 2 Divisions.

#### Under 16

To be structured on a divisional basis with at least Premier, Roinn 1 and Roinn 2 Divisions.

#### Under 14:

To be structured on a divisional basis with at least five divisions, Roinn 1 to Roinn 5.

#### Under 12:

To be structured on a divisional basis with at least five divisions, Roinn 1 to Roinn 5.

#### Motion 2 (Coiste Contae)

That Riail 7.5 (b) T.O. 2022 be amended to remove the maximum Term of Suspension to read as follows:

Where a minimum Suspension is prescribed in relation to an Infraction, the Council or Committee-in-Charge shall have due regard for the gravity of Infraction in each case. Where appropriate, the Council or Committee-in-Charge shall impose additional Match Suspension(s) or a longer Term of Suspension and shall provide reasons for the imposition of a penalty in excess of the minimum. In exceptionally serious cases the penalties of Debarment from playing or Expulsion may be imposed.

#### Motion 3 (Coiste Contae)

That Riail 7.2 (b) – Category VI and 7.2 (c) – Category Va T.O. 2022 be amended to increase the minimum Term of Suspension for assault on a match official to 2 Years (730 days) and to 4 Years (1,460 days) for a Repeat Infraction and that the definitions for a Repeat Infraction be updated accordingly.

#### Motion 4 (Coiste Contae)

That the restriction on tabling motions to revise Playing Rules in Riail 3.40 (d) T.O. 2022 be set aside temporarily for Congress in 2024 to allow the Standing Committee on Playing Rules to bring forward proposals to Congress in 2024 so as to simplify and streamline the Playing Rules of Hurling and Football.



#### Motion 5 (Coiste Contae)

That the section of Riail 6.17 – Age Grades T.O. 2022 in respect of Inter-County U20 (Hurling) be amended as follows to remove the restriction on players playing both Inter-County U20 Hurling Championship and Inter-County Senior Hurling Championship:

**Under 20 (Hurling):** A player shall have celebrated his 17th birthday prior to January 1st and his 20th birthday on or after January 1st of the Championship Year.

Such a player may only play in either the Inter-County Senior Hurling Championship (Tier 1) or the Inter-County U20 Hurling Championship in each seven-day period (Friday morning to the following Thursday night). Coming on as a substitute constitutes playing a game.

#### Motion 6 (Coiste Contae)

That the section of Riail 6.17 – Age Grades T.O. 2022 in respect of Inter-County U20 (Football) be amended as follows to remove the restriction on players playing both Inter-County U20 Football Championship and Inter-County Senior Football Championship:

**Under 20 (Football):** A player shall have celebrated his 17th birthday prior to January 1st and his 20th birthday on or after January 1st of the Championship Year.

Such a player may only play in either the Inter-County Senior Football Championship (Tier 1 or Tier 2) or the Inter-County U20 Hurling Championship in each seven-day period (Friday morning to the following Thursday night). Coming on as a substitute constitutes playing a game.

#### Motion 7 (Coiste Contae)

That Bye Law 2 (k) – Finance Sub Committee of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended to remove a representative from the auditors as a member of the committee with the amended rule to read as follows:

It shall consist of the County Chairperson, County Secretary, County Treasurer, and **four** others nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee. It shall consist of seven members.

The rest of the Rule is to remain unchanged.

#### Motion 8 (Coiste Contae)

That Bye Law 12 – Transfers within the County of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended to reflect the change decided at Congress 2022 that the words "Under 12 Grade or Over" be replaced by "any grade" with respect to the definition of First Club as set out in Riail 6.3 T.O. 2022.

#### Motion 9 (Coiste Contae)

That the Wexford Town Inter-Club Transfers section of Bye Law 12 (2) of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended as follows:

Subject to the Exceptions below, or unless otherwise exempted by the CCC, a player, including both underage and adult, must continue as a member of the Wexford Town Club of which they were a member on **1 November 2022**. This clause will remain in force until **1 November 2025**.

The rest of the Bye-Law remains unchanged by this motion.



#### Motion 10 (CLG Na Crosa Beaga/Baile Uí Mhurúin)

That Riail 6.17 – Age Grades T.O. 2022 be amended to read as follows:

#### **CLUB**

#### Adult:

A Player shall have celebrated his 17th birthday prior to January 1st of the Championship Year. **Under Age Grades** 

A County shall determine its internal Under Age Grades for competition purposes within the parameters of Under 21 down to Under 11, subject to the stipulation that competitions at Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18 must take place within each County together with one further underage competition above the Under 18 grade...

The rest of the Rule is to remain unchanged.

#### Motion 11 (CLG An Gleann-Baile Bearna)

That the U18 Exception section of Bye Law 14 of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended as follows:

#### **U18 Exception**

An U18 player (first year out of U17 Grade) will have free grading in the adult championship until the knockout stages and their status will be determined by playing in a championship grade in the knockout stages of that championship.

This exception permits the player to play in only one grade of championship in each code in each seven-day period (Friday morning to the following Thursday night). Coming on as a substitute constitutes playing a game.

For example, if an U18 player plays in the Junior B grade for their club's second team on Friday night, they can play again in the Junior B grade on the following Wednesday night (this may occur if there are back matches to be scheduled). However, this player may not play for their club's first team during this seven-day period.

A player availing of this rule who plays for a club's first team may not play, at any stage, with a club's third team for the remainder of the championship year pursuant to Riail 6.20 T.O. 2022.

A player availing of this rule who plays for a club's second team may not play, at any stage, with a club's fourth team for the remainder of the championship year pursuant to Riail 6.20 T.O. 2022.

The rest of the rule is to remain unchanged.

#### Motion 12 (CLG Baile Uí Cheog)

That Bye Law 14 of CLG Loch Garman Bye-Laws 2022 be amended to add the following:

Independent Teams as provided for under Riailacha 3.19(n), 6.3 and 6.8 T.O. 2022 shall play in the Highest Division only.



#### Motion 13 (CLG Naomh Mhuire Rosláir)

That every Club shall field at least one Hurling Team at Under 7 and/or Under 9 Age Grade and that every County shall organise hurling games on the 'Go Games' model for Under 7 and Under 9 Age Grades. Clubs shall be deemed exempt from this rule by their County Committee in the following circumstances:

- (i) any Exclusively Football Club that can demonstrate that it's Under 7 and/or Under 9 Players are afforded Hurling at an Exclusively Hurling Club or Dual Code Club;
- (ii) any wholly Adult Club that can demonstrate that its obligations under this Rule are met by an appropriate Juvenile Club; or
- (iii) any Club that, by sheer demographics, can demonstrate it does not have the numbers to comply.

<u>Penalty for Breach:</u> Fine of €250 for the first year of non-compliance by any Club, with the fine to double for each consecutive year of non-compliance.

Notes: This proposed Rule should be read in conjunction with Rule 6.27 Under 13 and Younger Age Grades "Go-Games". It is suggested that this Rule be inserted into Section 6 Games & Competitions of the Official Guide.

Other Rules Affected: None. For the avoidance of doubt this proposed Rule does not impact, nor is it impacted by, Rule 6.4 (d) Attachment to First Club.



# Tuarscáil an Runaí

Once again it is a great privilege and honour to write this report on the activities within the county in the last 12 months. Although this is my second report as Rúnaí Coiste Chontae Loch Garman, it is my first having completed a full year in the role and I really have seen first-hand the full workings of the Association from attending my first National Congress to all our Inter County and Club games and everything else in between.

It has been a very busy year both on and off the pitch for Wexford GAA as we had a full programme of games both at Inter County and Club level and also the infrastructure works that are part of our strategic plan which are being undertaken in Chadwicks Wexford Park, Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence and St Patricks Park.

I also must acknowledge and thank all our great volunteers both at Club and County level for their continued work and dedication without which we simply couldn't operate as an Association.

#### **County Teams**

#### Senior Hurling

Our Senior Hurlers began their year under the new management of Darragh Egan in the Walsh Cup. An opening round win against Laois and a very entertaining draw against Kilkenny saw us reach the final which was held in Croke Park but unfortunately it was the Dubs who came away with the spoils on the night.

Next it was onto the Allianz Hurling League where we welcomed the current All-Ireland champions Limerick to town and with a great atmosphere in Chadwicks Wexford Park we eventually came away with a hard-fought win by a goal. We followed that with wins against Clare, Galway, Offaly and Cork which seen us top Division 1A with maximum points and helped us secure a place in the semi-final against neighbours Waterford, unfortunately a heavy loss on the day seen us exit the league at the semi-final stage.

Attentions quicky moved onto Championship and an opening round game against Galway in Chadwicks Wexford Park. With minutes to go it didn't look likely that we would get anything from the game, but a great finish saw us snatch a draw.

A one-point loss at home to Dublin and a win and draw versus Laois and Westmeath respectively setup a must win game against Kilkenny in Nolan Park to remain in the championship. On a night to remember in Kilkenny the Wexford men came away with a four-point win but it was only good enough for 3rd place in the group and into the Preliminary Quarter-Final.

A comprehensive win against Kerry down in Tralee setup another Quarter Final versus Clare. During several stages of the game it looked like we were going to come away with the win, but a great Clare comeback saw us eventually lose by three points and so with it came an end to our year. Overall, there was huge positives to take in what was Darragh's first year in charge, with many new faces added to the squad, we all will look forward with hope for the team in 2023.

#### Senior Football

The Senior Footballers started the year in O'Byrne Cup action. A comprehensive win versus Laois in the first game was unfortunately followed by losses to Wicklow and Meath respectively which saw Wexford bow out at the group stage.

The start of the Allianz football league saw us host Sligo in the opening round. In a game that could of went either way we eventually lost by two points. There were wins versus London away and Waterford at home and a draw against Carlow to come but ultimately losses to Cavan, Tipperary and Leitrim saw us finish in 6th place in the division and we remain in division 4 for 2023.

The Leinster Championship was up next and a home game versus Offaly. After a great



performance from the team we came away with a three-point win and setup a home game once again versus Dublin. In 2021 there was a limit on crowd attendance when Dublin visited Chadwicks Wexford Park, so it was great this time around to have no limit on attendances. Ultimately the Dubs proved to be much stronger on the day and ran out comfortable winners.

The first year of the Tailteann Cup saw us drawn to play Offaly in the preliminary round, both teams were familiar with each other at this stage having met a few weeks previous in the Leinster Championship, but it was the Offaly men who would come away with the spoils this time around with a one-point win.

This would turn out to be Shane Roches last game in charge of the team as he stepped down as manager later in the year due to family commitments. I would like to thank Shane and his backroom team for their committed work to Wexford football and I'm sure we will see Shane involved again at some stage in Wexford football in the not-too-distant future.

The appointment of John Hegarty as Senior Football Manager is a step of continuality in keeping a Wexford man at the helm. John lined out for over a decade with the Wexford footballers and has won County titles both as a player and manager in the county. We wish John and his backroom team well for 2023 and I would encourage all our supporters to make a concerted effort to support our footballers and their new manager.

#### U-20 Football

Our U-20 footballers started their year competing in the Andrew Corden Cup which is a development league and helps preparations for championship. Wins versus Tipperary and Carlow and a loss to Waterford in the group stages of the competition saw us reach the final where we would play Carlow again but this time, however, Carlow would come out victorious and claim the cup.

The Leinster championship saw us play Longford in Parnell Park where a very good Longford outfit proved too strong on the night and this in turn saw an end to the year for our U-20s.

David Murphy stepped down later in the year as manager. David and his management team have done great work with the team over the last two years and I'm sure we will see David involved again with Wexford teams in the future.

#### U-20 Hurling

The U-20 hurlers started their championship campaign away to Westmeath and came away with convincing victory. Next up was another away game – this time Laois were the opponents and after a titanic tussle Wexford held on for a one-point win. This set up a semifinal against Dublin in Chadwicks Wexford Park which would prove to be another tight affair with another one-point victory for the Wexford men.

The final pitted us up against old foes Kilkenny, where we would this time be at the wrong side of a one-point loss, but the team showed great battling qualities to get themselves into a position in the dying seconds to nearly draw the game. A last-ditch effort for a point went inches wide and with it saw the end of the U-20 campaign.

Overall, Keith Rossiter and his management team should be happy with their first year in charge as three wins and a narrow defeat to the eventual All-Ireland champions can be seen as great foundations to build on in 2023.

#### Minor Football

Our Minor Footballers played in a round robin series in Leinster that included both Carlow and Wicklow, unfortunately we lost both games in the series which saw us exit Leinster but were into the Seamus Heaney Cup where we played Laois in a Semi-Final and won by the minimum to reach the final where a strong Meath outfit ran out eventual winners.

#### Minor Hurling

The Minor hurlers also played in a round robin series in Leinster that included Dublin and Kilkenny, first up saw a great win away to Dublin but a loss to Kilkenny saw us into the quarter finals instead of the semis. An away game to Laois was next and despite being



down to 14 men for nearly all the second half Wexford still found themselves winning deep into injury time but a last-minute goal from Laois saw them through and Wexford exit in the harshest of ways.

Many thanks to all Managers, Selectors and Backroom personnel, too numerous to mention of all our county teams. It was a very busy year which requires huge commitment and dedication from all those involved for which Wexford GAA is grateful of the time given by all.

#### **Club Championships**

The Pettitt's Senior hurling championship got underway on the 28th of June with a full round of games midweek as this was necessary in order to finish both hurling and football in the 16-week period that we had to complete the championships and have representation in the provincial championships.

There were some great games served up in the championship and every game was hotly contested this was especially evident in Group A as going into the last round of games only Naomh Éanna were assured of a place in the Quarter Finals and every other team had a chance of still making the knockout stages and in fact the bottom team at that stage Faythe Harriers secured a Knockout spot with a win over Cloughbawn.

There is only one team we can really think of though when we talk about the 2022 Pettitt's Senior Hurling Championship and that is Ferns St Aidans as they made history in claiming their first ever Wexford Senior title, what great colour their supporters brought to Chadwicks Wexford Park that sunny day in August and what a great score from Jonny Dwyer to seal the win.

The Dominic Smith Expert Electrical Senior Football Championship got underway the 26th of August. The 2021 champions Shelmaliers looked once again the team to beat as they went 5 from 5 in the group stages and impressive wins in the quarter and semi-finals set them up for a chance to retain their title but Castletown lay in waiting and were in no mood to let that happen and fully deserved

their victory which also saw them go as outright leaders on the Roll of Honour with 12 senior titles. One can only think of the late Joe O'Shaughnessy and how happy he would have been to see his beloved club lift the Seamus Keevans Cup but I'm sure he was looking down on the men in Maroon that day.

Oulart-The Ballagh returned to senior ranks at their first attempt with a win against Taghmon-Camross in the Courtyard Ferns Intermediate Hurling decider. In the Ashdown Park & Amber Springs Hotels Intermediate Football Final, St. Mogue's Fethard came out on top against district rivals Horeswood to see them promoted back to the Senior ranks.

Meanwhile in the Joyce's Expert Intermediate A Hurling Championship, Horeswood keep rising the grades as they saw off the challenge of Liam Mellows in a hard fought battle while the Whizzy Internet Intermediate 'A' Football title was won by Adamstown after a three point victory over Cloughbawn who lost their second final in a row.

In the Junior Championships, Davidstown-Courtnacuddy got the better of Glynn-Barntown after a replay to claim the Permanent TSB Junior Hurling Championship while Monageer-Boolavogue defeated Sarsfields in the Enniscorthy Farm Systems Junior Football Championship.

Buffers Alley (Football) and Clongeen (Hurling) were also worthy winners in the Junior A competitions, overcoming Shelmaliers and Ballyhogue respectively.

The Permanent TSB Junior B hurling winners were Glynn-Barntown and the Enniscorthy Farm Systems Junior B Football champions were Oulart The Ballagh.

In the inaugural Panda U-19 hurling championships there were wins for Buffers Alley in the Premier, St Brigid's Blackwater in Division 1, Duffry Rovers Division 2 and St Marys Rosslare in Division 3. At the time of writing the Panda U-19 Football championship are still ongoing.



While much debate surrounds this age grade and when is the right time to play it we can't lose sight of the importance of the grade between minor and adult and a consensus must be found to make sure we carter for these players and try improve player retention in our county.

It takes a huge effort to run the championships and I would like to thank everyone who has given their time and effort to see the smooth running of our games, we also thank all clubs who made their venues available for games throughout the year.

#### **Facilities**

Once again Michael Lynch has to get great recognition for the great work and service he carries out in St Patricks Park with such an extremely busy programme of games that the ground caters for with Adult, underage, Ladies and Camogie fixtures all taking place there. A Thank you to all stewards who helped at venues for the games under the guidance of Dave Ormonde.

John Kehoe was appointed as Head Groundskeeper and Facilities Manager for Wexford GAA earlier in the year and has the pitch at Chadwicks Wexford Park in great order for every game, with Seamus O'Brien keeping the Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence in top shape.

#### **Wexford GAA TV**

Wexford GAA TV is going from strength to strength each year and is providing a top-class service for supporters to enjoy our games live wherever they are in the world, while the weekly preview shows or discussions around the latest topics in the county are proving to be a big hit also. This would not be possible without the expert work of Finbar Flanagan and Lar Sutton and also Peter Mernagh and his team of commentators.

#### **CCC/Fixtures**

Having now served over a year on the CCC Fixtures Committee I have a better understanding of the complexities of running our games and how much cooperation is needed from everybody involved to see the smooth running of all our competitions.

Special thanks must go to the members of the CCC/Fixtures Committee Bobby Goff (Chairperson) Marion Doyle, Seamus Whelan, Joan Furlong, Justin Browne, John O'Neill, Seamus Kennelly and Gabriel Wade for their tireless work during the year. Please see report from John O'Neill (Fixture Analyst) for a more comprehensive breakdown of games.

The four Districts ran their Junior B competitions and once again provided a great programme of games for these players. I would like to thank all the District Officers and in particular the secretaries and chairperson for their work.

#### **Discipline**

Discipline has once again been a huge topic within our county this year and unfortunately is getting worse rather than improving which is of huge concern. We all have responsibility when it comes to discipline be it from the stands on our side-lines or the players that take the field.

Although there has been a huge drive on recruitment of referees this year we are still on a similar number of referees within the county as last year and who can blame someone not wanting to take up the whistle if the threat of abuse is so probable be it verbal or physical. I implore all our members to think before you react to a decision during a game as all our attitudes must change or we simply won't have anyone to referee our games in the future.

I would like to thank Chairperson, Aidan O'Leary, Secretary, Joe Sheehan, and the other committee members for dealing with all disciplinary matters in an efficient manner. Their full report is available as part of Tuarascálacha na bhFochoistí.

On the refereeing side, I would like to thank Denis Cadogan and Seamus Whelan and all their committee for their assistance in appointing, educating and assisting referees on match days during the year. All our match officials are valuable to our fixtures programme, and I also thank them for their time and dedication.



I would like to thank chairperson, Margaret Doyle, secretary, Eddie Nangle and all the members of the Hearings Committee for their contributions and making themselves available whenever the situations arose and to ensure that rules and procedures are properly followed and ensuring that the GAA's Disciplinary Code is implemented in a fair and efficient manner. The full report on their work is available as part of Tuarascálacha na bhFochoistí.

#### "Respect the Ref" Workshops

In response to the unacceptable behaviour that happened towards our referring officials during the year, all clubs were asked to hold a "Respect the Ref" workshop to carry out a self-assessment of the Clubs conduct of their players, mentors, parents and supporters towards match officials.

All clubs held workshops within the requested timeframe with 1,124 attendees. There were 53 different actions, that clubs committed to take in respect of the conduct of their players, mentors, parents and supporters towards match officials.

Across the various stakeholder groups, the main actions that clubs proposed to undertake were:

- Brief all stakeholders on the Code of Conduct and Code of Behaviour through meetings, handouts and social media.
- Promote the message of respect to players at all training sessions and games and to promote the same message on every match notification via messages or social media to mentors, parents and supporters.
- Formal club disciplinary procedures based upon the Code of Behaviour and An Treoir Oifigiúil to be set out and embedded in the culture of the club.
- Annual workshops in the club with a referee to speak with players, mentors and others regarding the rules of the game and an open Q&A.
- Improve and increase signage in clubs for with the "Give Respect, Get Respect" message

Wexford GAA has commenced a research project with Dr. Daniel Regan, a senior research fellow in UCD. The goal of the Safety, Order & Respect of Referees Trial (SORRTit) is to completely reduce the highest categories of physical and verbal abuse. This requires a culture, ethos and process reset. Dr. Regan's work focuses on optimising measurement of people's behaviours and combining this with behavioural interventions to generate change.

#### **Finance**

We delivered a net surplus of €652k for the year ended 30 September 2022. This operating surplus was utilised to invest €438k in upgrades to Chadwicks Wexford Park. Wexford GAA continues to be on a sound financial footing which is essential given the upcoming investments of €4 million into infrastructure projects, and €1 million into Games Development & Coaching as outlined in our Strategic Plan.

Again, an extraordinary effort went into the Model County Draw this year. Our annual repayment relating to the development of Halo Tiles Wexford GAA COE was met and the clubs themselves benefited as a result of their retained sales.

I would like to thank all involved in the smooth and efficient running of the draw and, in particular, acknowledge the work of our coordinators Joe Sheehan, Joe Tully, John Hanton and Liam Roche.

2023 will bring continued financial challenges with the economic impact of inflation and the uncertainty as a result of the war in Ukraine. It is important to note that given the planned investments, we cannot afford to be complacent and must continue to work hard fundraising and managing costs.

I would like to thank Micheál Martin, Andrew Nolan and Joe Sheehan for their work throughout the year in relation to the county's finances which is positively reflected in our financial statements.



### Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence

Wexford GAA were delighted when we received notification that planning had been granted for the addition of two new pitches, a training area, and the development of an entrance from the N11 at the Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence.

Works have started on the new pitches and will be available for use later next year while works on the new entrance from the N11 will happen in the new year. Professional Architectural Services have been sought in regard to the proposed extension to the Dressing Room Building along with associated siteworks.

It is hoped to finalise agreement with Wexford Camogie and Wexford LGFA in 2023 on a Memorandum of Understanding in respect of Halo Tiles COE so as to provide a single base for all the elite teams in the count.

#### **Chadwicks Wexford Park**

Chadwicks Wexford Park has been a hub of activity this year in regard to our planned infrastructure upgrades. Initial pitch maintenance works including re-seeding goal mouths, verti-draining, sanding and overseeding was completed in early May which then led to the installation of the new irrigation system while also laying down an Astro-Turf area along the side-line in front of the main stand.

The pitch was back in action by early July for our club games and has been in excellent condition all year, especially for our county finals as all winning captains complemented the condition of the pitch in their speeches.

Works on installing floodlights began in early November, it is expected that the light poles will be erected in December. The lights will be commissioned, and concourse lighting installed, the first game under floodlights in Chadwicks Wexford Park will be a Walsh Cup game on 21 January 2023 and will include a host of significant events to mark the occasion. Special mention and thanks must go to Dave Tobin as Safety and Facilities Officer and his

committee for the work on these projects so far.

Wexford GAA received €200,000 from the GAA County Capital Infrastructure Grants which will go towards the works carried out this year along with funds from Wexford GAA's Infrastructure Development Fund.

Facilities and the pitch at the venue are maintained and monitored by John Kehoe, David Ormonde, Bobby Goff and many more people, thanks to all who have contributed to the process.

#### Coaching

On the coaching front it was another busy year for everyone involved and this area is the most important because if we fall behind in coaching, we will suffer in the years to come on the pitch which as a County is our main aim to strive for excellence both at Club and County level.

The Go Games programme this year was very successfully, this is where our stars of the future will learn the fundamentals of the games and where first and foremost it is about fun, enjoyment, and participation this should never be forgotten. I would like to thank the Go Games Committee for all their work throughout the year.

A huge amount of games was played in the U-13 to U-17 grades this year and massive credit must go to the Coiste na nÓg committees led by John Kenny for organising it in such an efficient manner. These grades are still about development of our young players, and I would encourage parents and mentors to not lose sight of this as player retention is one of the main issues we face as an organisation into the future, this is especially the case for rural clubs as the findings of the Demographics task force committee led by George Hussey emphasised to clubs earlier in the year.

As was stated in last year's report, our Cúl Camps continue to be a success with over 6,000 attendees over our 45 venues. Thank you to all the Camp Co-ordinators and 130 coaches that were involved to fulfil the



massive demand this year and to James Flynn who led the way in organizing the camps over a six-week period.

Wexford GAA leads the way in regard to inclusion and this can be seen first-hand with our first ever Cúl Camp in partnership with Down Syndrome Wexford held in the Faythe Harriers GAA pitch and our now annual ASD Kelloggs CÚl Camp which was once again in Chadwicks Wexford Park.

Our inclusion camps allow children with autism and their siblings attend a camp that is tailored to their needs. Over 200 children took part this year which was an increase on the number who took part last year.

I would like to thank Down Syndrome Wexford, Wexford Sports Partnership and Cottage Autism Network Wexford for their continued help and support. Finally, occasions such as these camps would not be possible without the volunteers and staff, who give their time to ensure a safe, fun & inclusive camp. We wish to say thank you and well done.

I must give great credit to our Coaching Officer Tom Cousins as he has put in a huge amount of work, time and commitment to the role over the last two years and for that I would like to thank him. We are sad to see Tom step down from the role as he is a huge asset to Wexford GAA but hopefully in the future Tom will be back involved at some level. For a more comprehensive breakdown of coaching please see Tom's full report available as part of Tuarascálacha na bhFochoistí.

### Wexford GAA High-Performance Plan for Hurling

The Wexford GAA High-Performance Plan for Hurling was launched earlier this year. Its vision is to develop MODEL players, coaches and teams to consistently achieve success at the highest level. The mission is to create a high-performance environment where sustained success can be achieved, alongside a progressive approach to player and coach development and participation.

The existing structure of our Games Manager, Ray Harris, together with our GDAs and GPOs will continue to have their present responsibilities in respect of participation and the Model Academy.

Declan Browne has been appointed as Director of Athletic Performance. Declan is the Programme Director for the MSc Strength & Conditioning in South East Technological University. Through our partnership with SETU, Declan's responsibilities within his current role have been changed to include his responsibilities as Director of Athletic Development within our High-Performance Plan for Hurling.

Niall Williams has been employed as our Coach & Player Development Manager (Director of Hurling) as part of our High-Performance Plan for Hurling.

Niall has numerous qualifications including a Certificate in Sports Coaching and a MSc. in Coaching & Exercise Science. Niall, who has recently moved to live in New Ross, spent ten years as a GPO with Dublin GAA and has been the Coach Education and Development Officer for the Camogie Association for the past four years. He also has a wealth of coaching experience across multiple codes at all levels and, most recently, with St. Martin's who were narrowly beaten in this year's county final.

### Integrated Athletic Development Programme

The vision for the Integrated Athletic
Development Programme is to implement a
coherent approach towards the area of
strength and conditioning in Wexford for
youth footballers and hurlers.

The mission is to work with clubs and post primary schools to develop the physical literacy skills of adolescents in Wexford.

Eoin Devine O'Grady has been employed as a GDA with responsibility for the implementation of the Integrated Athletic Development Programme. Eoin has a BSc. in Sports Science and a MSc. In Strength & Conditioning. He has worked previously as an S&C Coach with Carlow GAA in respect of



strength and conditioning programmes for youth players and has spent the last five years as a GDA in Longford GAA with responsibility for performance coaching.

#### **Deceased Members**

Over the past 12 months, we have sadly lost many gaels who have contributed massively to Wexford GAA over the years. Seamus Barron sadly passed away during the year a former All Ireland winning player in hurling at Minor, U21 and Senior and was also part of the management team of the 1996 All Ireland winning team. John Rossiter who many people would have associated him with all things refereeing within the county also went to his eternal rest. Martin O'Connor who sadly passed away in a tragic farming accident during the year and was serving as Duffry Rovers Chairman at the time.

We remember all associated with Wexford GAA who passed away during the year and the many involved in Wexford GAA and the wider GAA community who lost family members also.

#### Report of Management of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman

Coiste Bainistí CLG Loch Garman presents its annual report together with audited financial statements of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman for the twelve months ended 30<sup>th</sup> September 2022. The comparative figures throughout this report are for the eleven month period ended 30<sup>th</sup> September 2021.

#### Principal activities

Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is the governing body for the Gaelic Athletic Association in County Wexford. The principal activity of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is the development and promotion of Gaelic games as a principal component of Irish identity and culture.

As well as developing and promoting the games in the county, Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is responsible for the preparation of the Wexford inter county teams and the operation of club championships, leagues and various other competitions at all levels.

#### Results

The results for the year as set out in the Income and Expenditure Account show an operating surplus of €848,807 (2021: €1,006,511) and a net surplus after depreciation of €652,119 (2021: €828,317). This operating surplus was utilised to invest €437,780 in upgrades to Chadwicks Wexford Park together with repayments on the existing loan on Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence of €123,280. The remainder of the surplus from 2022 will be utilised in the planned investments in Chadwicks Wexford Park and Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence during 2023.

#### Events since the period end

No significant events occurred since the balance sheet date, which require disclosure in the financial statements.

#### **Books and records**

Coiste Bainistí is responsible for keeping proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman. The books and accounting records of the board are maintained at Chadwicks Wexford Park, Clonard Road, Wexford.

#### **Auditors**

The auditors, Martin Quigley & Co, have indicated their willingness to continue in office.

#### Notes to the Accounts

#### 1. Statement of compliance

These financial statements comprising the Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet and the related notes constitute the financial statements of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman for the financial year ended 30<sup>th</sup> September 2022.

Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is an unincorporated association. The nature of the association's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Report of Management of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman.

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the accounting policies noted below and the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland" ("FRS102").

Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is considered to be a public benefit entity.

#### 2. Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the associations financial statements.

#### Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with historical cost convention, the accounting policies noted below and FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council and promulgated by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Ireland. The financial statements are stated in Euro which is the functional currency of Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman.

#### Disclosure exemptions for qualifying entities under FRS 102

FRS 102 allows a qualifying entity certain disclosure exemptions. Coiste Chontae CLG Loch Garman is a qualifying entity and has taken advantage of the below available disclosure exemptions for qualifying entities.

(i) Exemption from the requirement of FRS 102 paragraph 33.7 to disclose key management personnel compensation in total.

#### Gate receipts

Gate receipts are stated gross on a remittance basis before deduction of match expenses.

#### Grants

Grants receivable and payable are included in the Income and Expenditure Account in the year in which they are approved in principle.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current and non-current liabilities.



#### Notes to the accounts

#### Financial assets

Basic financial assets, including other receivable and cash and bank balances are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Such assets are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. At the end of each reporting period financial assets measured at amortised cost are assessed for objective evidence of impairment. If an asset is impaired the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in income or expenditure. If there is a decrease in the impairment loss arising from an event occurring after the impairment was recognised the impairment loss is reversed. The reversal is such that the carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised. The impairment reversal is recognised in income or expenditure. Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or are settled; or substantially all the risks and rewards of the ownership of the asset are transferred to another party; or control of the asset has been transferred to another party who has the practical ability to unilaterally sell the asset to an unrelated third party without imposing additional restrictions on the transfer.

#### Other financial assets

Other financial assets including trade receivable for goods sold to customers on short-term credit, are initially measured at the undiscounted amount of cash receivable from that customer, which is normally the invoice price, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost less impairment, where there is objective evidence of an impairment.

#### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or valuation, less accumulated depreciation. Provision is made for depreciation on all tangible assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation of each asset over their estimated useful life on a straight-line basis, as set out below.

Land -Nil Chadwicks Wexford Park – 2% Straight Line Halo Tiles Wexford GAA COE – 2% Straight Line Equipment -12.5% Straight Line Development St Patricks Park -5% - 10% Straight Line

#### **Employee benefits**

Short term benefits

Short term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits, are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is received.



#### 2. Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The Management Committee makes judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that were not readily apparent from other sources in the application of the Board's accounting policies. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from the estimates.

#### Critical judgements

Management is of the opinion that there are no critical judgements (other than those involving estimates) that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

#### Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

#### Useful economic lives of fixed assets

Fixed assets comprising primarily grounds and fixtures and equipment represent a significant portion of total assets. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated lives of each type of asset and, in certain circumstances, estimates of residual values. Management regularly review these useful lives and change them if necessary to reflect current conditions. In determining these useful lives management consider technological change, patterns of consumption, physical condition and expected economic utilisation of the assets. Changes in the useful lives can have a significant impact on the depreciation charge for the financial year. See Note 4 for the carrying amount of fixed assets.

#### Impairment of other receivables

Management assesses loans and receivable on a continuous basis for any objective evidence of impairment by considering factors, including the ageing profile, the creditworthiness and the past collection history of each receivable. If the financial condition of these receivables were to deteriorate, resulting in an impairment of their ability to make payments, additional allowances may be required.

# Competitions Control Committee - Fixtures

I left the February Co Committee meeting with some trepidation on how we could run the two groups of six over such a short time frame, but with the help and cooperation of the Clubs, Referees, Gatemen, stewards and so many more, we got through without too many hitches.

### **The Leagues**

The Leagues started in March with every second week of Football and Hurling, and as you will read from John O'Neill in his fixtures analysts report, we had less walkovers than in 2021. The leagues can be uncompetitive with no promotion or relegation, and you have team 3 playing team 5 with nothing to really play for. We need to develop the leagues as a competitive second competition.

### **The Championship**

The most common complaint made on the split season is that the Hurling and Football are ran over eight weeks, with not even a mention of the leagues.

The big disappointment for me was the U19 Hurling championship with so many teams entering and then withdrawing and other clubs conceding walkovers with no concern for their opponents.

The only thing that remains is to thank everyone who has make this year a success, particularly the clubs who have given their facilities so willingly sometimes when they were playing at another venue at the same time, but a small minority of clubs forget that if other clubs didn't give their venues, they would not get their own games played.

The other unsung heroes are the four district committees who successfully ran a comprehensive Junior B games programme, and really only getting the crumbs from the table as regards dates to play fixtures, with midweek fixtures in adult and U19 and games on Friday nights. The Junior B championship is now where most 18-year-olds get regular games, I thank Joe, Ollie, Seamus and Michael.

The detailed report of all the leagues and championship games is written by our fixture's analyst John O'Neill and I would like to thank John for his great work

The last but by no means least people to thank are the County Chairperson, Micheál Martin, the media, People newspapers group and Southeast radio for the excellent coverage of our games, the staff in Chadwick's Wexford Park, particularly Marion and Gavin for all their advice and help during the year and John Kehoe who looks after the pitch and grounds so well. Michael Lynch and his Family and Dave Ormonde.

The CCC Committee who all have their own specific jobs, Justin Brown, John O Neill, Michael Hennessey- Cullen, Marion Doyle, Joan Furlong, Seamus Kennelly, Gabriel Wade and Seamus Whelan the referee's administrator who with his committee definitely has the hardest job getting



all matches covered with referees and linesmen where possible. I ask every club to try and get at least one new referee. Finally, to anyone I forgot, thank you all.

# Fixtures Analyst's Report

### League

There were 57 teams entered in the Football League comprising of 26 clubs which entered 1 Team, 14 clubs which entered 2 Teams and one club which entered 3 Teams. It began on Weekend of 12th March and ended on 12th June

Of the 3 entitled teams who did not enter 2 were from Div 4 (Junior Teams) with 1 from Div 5 ( Junior A Teams) . Two of these were clubs 1st Teams and one their 2nd Team

In all 167 matches, including 5 Finals, were scheduled to be played with 137 being completed giving a compliance rate of 82%. This compares with a compliance rate of 80.3% in 2021. Of the 137 played 66, that is 48%, were changed by clubs from the original fixture.

Of the 30 not played 22 were conceded with the remaining 8 Postponed and not refixed by the clubs involved. 6 of these were from Rd 1 due to inclement weather

60 Teams were entered in the Hurling League which began on the Weekend of 19th March and concluded on 19th June. Of these 25 Clubs entered 1 Team, 16 entered 2 Teams and one club entered 3 Teams

Including Finals 185 matches were scheduled to be played. 172 of these were completed with a compliance rate of 92.97%. This compares with a compliance rate of 90% in 2021. Of the 172 matches completed 99 or 57.5% were changed by clubs from the original fixture.

Of the 13 matches not completed 10 were conceded with 3 Postponed and not played

### Championship

In football from Senior to Junior B 85 Teams competed in the championship. This was made up of 12 Teams in each Div from Senior to Junior , 11 Teams in Junior A, and in Junior B Wexford District 9 Teams , Enniscorthy District 5 Teams ,Gorey District 7 Teams, and New Ross District 5 Teams

In Hurling 98 Teams competed made up of 12 Teams in the Divs from Senior to Junior A , and in Junior B Wexford District 10 Teams ,Enniscorthy District 11 Teams , Gorey District 9 Teams and New Ross District 8 Teams . The breakdown of Clubs/Teams are as follows : Football: 6 clubs with 3 Teams, 27 clubs with 2 Teams , 12 clubs with 1 Team Hurling: 2 clubs with 4 Teams 13 clubs with 3 Teams 23 Clubs with 2 Teams 5 Clubs with 1 Team

The Football Championship began on 22nd April with Junior B matches in both the Wexford and Gorey Districts and finished with the County Junior B Final on 28th October. Senior to Junior A kicked off on Weekend of 27th August and was completed on the Weekend of 15th October. In all 191 matches were scheduled from Senior to Junior A and the County Junior B championship with 190 being completed with 1 match conceded.. A further 83 matches were scheduled in the District Junior B League sections with 66 being completed and 17 matches conceded.



The total number of matches scheduled over all Levels was therefore 274 with 256 being completed with gives a compliance rate of 93.43%

Gorey District got the Hurling Championship underway with the 1st round of Junior B on 1st April with the Senior to Junior A commencing with a mid-week round on 28th June. The Hurling Championship concluded with the Junior Final Replay and the Junior B Final on 20th August.

With 2 matches conceded 196 games were played out of a possible 198 from Senior to Junior A and including the County Junior B matches. A further 138 matches were scheduled in the District Junior B League Section with 113 being completed and 25 matches conceded.

Over all grades a total of 336 matches were scheduled with 309 being completed and 27 conceded. This gives a compliancy rate of 92%

### **U19 Championship**

An u19 competition was chosen by clubs to bridge the gap between underage and adult and to help to improve player retention at this age level. It was proposed to run the U19 Hurling Championship mid-week during the adult Championship in July and August with the Football Championship to run from the end of October when both the Adult Football Championship and the underage u17 Championship concludes. Clubs taking part in both Championships , Hurling and Football, would be allocated a minimum of 4 matches in both codes .

Originally 29 clubs entered the U19 Hurling Championship and the grading for the Divisions ratified at the County Board meeting in June

This would have resulted in a total of 66 matches being fixed at this age group in hurling. Unfortunately 7 Clubs withdrew before the beginning of the competition leaving 22 teams remaining with a total of 40 matches to be fixed.

Of these 40 fixtures 27 were played with a total of 13 games conceded giving a compliancy rate of 67.5%. If we take the original number of fixtures before the withdrawals i.e 66, we get a compliancy rate of 41%

Of the 22 Teams who remained in the Championship 3 Teams did not fulfil any of their fixtures.

Of the remaining Teams 1 played 5 matches, 6 Played 4 matches, 5 played 3 matches, 3 played 2 matches and 4 played only 1 match . The 12 Teams who played less than the 4 matches promised was due to those teams either giving or getting walkovers.

From the above figures it would appear that an urgent and in-depth review is needed if this competition is to progress.

26 Teams have entered the U19 Football Championship which has not commenced at the time of writing. It will commence on the weekend of 5th November with a total of 59 matches to be



scheduled. Although this competition will be played during Autumn/Winter months it will also be played when no other GAA competitions are in progress. Hopefully with no other competitions being played will result in it running more successfully than the Hurling competition.

# Competitions Control Committee - Discipline

What more needs to be said about Disciplinary issues within Wexford GAA that has not already been said in the local, national and social media.

When will it STOP?
Where will it STOP?
Who will take action to STOP?
How will it STOP?

Is the number of cases of 200 cases this year an acceptable figure (the highest number of cases in all the years I have been Secretary of the County Discipline committee). A Summary of cases is detailed below.

With approx. 700 matches played across adult League and Championship this equates to approx. 20% of all matches (in some games there would be the occurrence of more than 1 Disciplinary issue).



We all know the difficulty in getting volunteers involved in our clubs and with teams but it should be borne in mind that these volunteers are representing the club and hence it is important that all volunteers are reminded of their responsibilities and behaviour on a regular basis.

We would ask all clubs to work hard in endeavouring to instil in their players, officials and mentors a greater responsibility with regard to discipline both on and off the field with respect for officials being a priority.

Clubs need to take control of this situation as it should not be forgotten that without referees and linesmen we would not be able stage our games and they are all deserving of respect whether you agree or not with their decision making.

The level of abuse is also leading to difficulties in the recruitment of new referees.

Our organisation needs a change of culture and attitude to discipline and this needs to start now, This change will only happen with the efforts of everyone concerned.

Let the journey begin now and there is no telling where it will end.

All cases were dealt with in a fair manner and suspensions proposed were at all times considered appropriate to the Infraction reported.

# **Hearings Committee**

During the course of 2022, the Hearings Committee met on eight occasions, starting on 21st March, ending on 4th November. The committee, which has a membership of eight, recently rising to nine, dealt with 13 cases during the year. The average attendance at meetings was six.

The Hearings Committee deals only with cases who request a hearing, after a penalty has been initially proposed by CCC. Only about 10% of the cases dealt with by CCC are referred to the Hearings Committee – the remaining 90% accept the proposed penalty.

The first notable feature of this year's activity was the fall in the number of offences. In 2021, the total number of offences was 23; in 2020 only 7 cases were heard – the much reduced number of games due to Covid19. This year, after a full programme of games in both codes, the total number of offences heard was only 13.

### Notes:

As can be seen from the accompanying list of the cases referred to Hearings during 2022, 'verbal abuse of match officials', especially referees, ranks first out of the 13 cases, with four such offences. The last six years – with the exception of 2020, which had none – have seen this offence appear two to three times on average annually and seeing it rise in 2022 to four, indicates a worrying trend. It would seem to fit in with the national figure, which has also been rising steadily. This has resulted in the recent national emphasis on giving respect to officials, especially to referees. Supporters, players and team officials all need to take on board the necessity of adopting such an approach to match officials, especially referees.

The offence 'behaving in a manner dangerous to an opponent' also sees a slight increase in numbers, 2019 being the last year in which the offence featured to the same extent. 'Striking with minimum force' shows a welcome decrease, falling from 5 to 2, with 'pulling on opponent's helmet' again appearing after a one-year absence. 'Disruptive conduct by supporters' as distinct from 'verbal abuse of officials' appeared only once, as did 'striking with hand' and 'stamping'.

Due to the compressed nature of both the hurling and football championships, with games on successive weekends up to county finals, it was necessary to call hearings meetings at very short notice. In order to allow the possibility of players or clubs taking their cases to Leinster Hearings before the following weekend's games, meetings were held as close as possible to the Wednesday or Thursday nights after the weekend games. This required the co-operation of club secretaries and other officials; we wish to acknowledge this co-operation. We would also like to recognize the

assistance of CCC officers and committee members, and the office staff in Chadwicks Wexford Park. Members of the Hearings committee itself should also be acknowledged in attending meetings, again at very short notice during the playing season.

Early in 2022, the committee lost John Rossiter, Oulart, a long-serving member, to illness. John served on the committee with distinction, his knowledge of the rules of the Association being both comprehensive and accurate. His service on the committee will be sadly missed.

# **Coaching Officer**

It is with great honour that I present to you my Coaching Officer's Report for this year. I am very proud of what we have accomplished in 2022, and I have every confidence that with your continued support Wexford GAA will continue to grow, prosper and stay on the path pursuing both high participation and excellence.

### Ar Aghaidh Linn le Chéile

As promised with our Strategic Plan, coaching is at the forefront of Wexford GAA. We have shown consistently that Coaching and Games is a priority in helping Wexford GAA continue to flourish and grow. As every coach and club will acknowledge, we set out each year to achieve and balance both participation and competition. We aim to be competitive throughout the year creating strong and skillful players, while creating an environment where our players will continue to play the game that we love. As Wexford GAA set out our plan we aim to give opportunities to clubs, players and coaches to grow and develop, both in terms of participation and performance. This combined leads to a thriving GAA scene in Wexford.

### **Go Games**

This year we had a very successful Go Games campaign. We have had incredibly positive feedback from clubs following the 2022 campaign, which allowed us to gauge what it is that really works in terms of getting the most out of our young developing players. One influencing factor that is having a positive impact on these games is that there is no pressure put on the players to perform. Our Go Games committee have been forward thinking and showed great initiative, and I know from speaking with them that progression won't stop here. Thanks to the Go Games Committee of Dermot Ryan, Shane Ready, Darren Caulfield, Gary Curley and Ray Harris. We have a committee who are engaged and want the best for the entire county. Leading into 2023, they propose a number of deviations including the introduction of smaller sided games, more blitz days, referee education for coaches, more focus on skill execution and continued emphasis on the enjoyment of our games.

### Youth Games (u13 to u17)

Firstly a huge well done to all players and coaches who put so much time into making our games so successful this year. A huge thanks to the families and club officers who helped facilitate and organise in getting teams on the field. I must give credit to the Coiste na nÓg committee and the CCC on creating a fantastic calendar of games culminating in some incredible finals. A special word of thanks to all the referees for their commitment throughout the year, who play such a pivotal part in our games calendar.

With a full year of games being completed, we now have time to reflect on how we can increase game time for our players, both in a competitive sense and also in terms of allowing all our players a chance to develop. Our year was successful, and yet we had some challenges. These challenges, from grading to developmental leagues, give us the opportunity to create solutions which put Wexford GAA in a stronger position going forward.

### **Additional Playing Opportunities**

Whilst competition is hugely important, it should not be the only thing on which we measure success. As I have mentioned before, increasing participation is essential in building a solid foundation for years to come. I do acknowledge the importance of competition, but we are certain that we need additional tournaments and developmental leagues at key times of the year so that those able to play can play. We have continued to run additional tournaments at even age outside of championship structure. Rising Stars has been a huge success in providing bigger



clubs with an opportunity to field a number of teams at each grade. A big thanks to Paul Laffan for co-ordinating and liaising with all those clubs involved in this initiative, in what has been yet again a huge success.

### **Model Óg Development Squads**

Wexford GAA Model Óg Academy 2022 included over 350 players from u13 to u16 playing Hurling and Football. We saw an incredible commitment by players, parents and coaches alike. With an emphasis in 2022 on widening our base of players, keeping them in our system for longer and developing the person in addition to the player, our squad players require a large volume of coaches. Credit to our Talent Development Leaders JJ Doyle (Hurling) and Anthony Masterson (Football) for their work in firstly recruiting coaches but also up-skilling coaches and being on the field on a weekly basis, all to ensure we get the best for our players.

The coaches have led the way across all grades through their high quality sessions and innovative thinking, with S&C being coordinated and implemented across all grades to provide continuity from year to year, and also to be able to focus on the specific code they are playing. In saying that, we are conscious that we have keep sight of where we are going in the future. We need to continue to prioritise the recruitment of these coaches, and that is where the input from clubs is so important.

In line with our plans to look ahead we currently have a review process of Academy Squads in Wexford GAA, focusing on where our current structures are in terms of Policy and Procedure, Athletic Development, Coaching, Access to Players, Dual Players and looking at how we can link schools, clubs and academy squads together.

### **Cúl Camps**

Yet again, as we did back in 2021, we have surpassed our own expectations in terms of attendance and participation in our Cúl Camps. We had a total of 45 camps over a six week period, we had over 6000 children in attendance. Huge thanks to the very efficient and hard working James Flynn for organizing this year's camps. We have a fantastic team of full time staff (GPO's and GDA's) who have been incredible. Our staff are the corner stone in setting the standards in the camps for both fun and professionalism, a mantle that they are only too happy to carry.

I cannot emphasise enough the importance of the club in underpinning a successful camp. It's not just about the use of your grounds, but it's the care and attention you pay those children before and after we run the camps. As a club, you also have a huge talent pool of new and young coaches who have been trained up and are ready to be utilized. This year we had 130 coaches, which ultimately allows us an opportunity to also develop the next generation of coaches in our clubs. I would challenge you, as clubs, to go out and seek those coaches and utilize them in your Go Games and underage teams. When you have such skilled and talented people on your own doorstep, use them.

Yet again, a highlight of our camps was our ASD Camp in Chadwick's Wexford Park. Thanks to our close link with Sports Active Wexford it allowed us to welcome over 200 children with autism, as well as their siblings, to a week of GAA in a safe and fun environment. Huge credit must go to Cottage Autism Network for their help, assistance and guidance. This camp also gives our top coaches a chance to come together and really showcase how inclusive Wexford GAA is. As promised last year, we set out to introduce more initiatives to spread inclusivity, we also had our first Cúl Camp in partnership with Down Syndrome Wexford- held in the Faythe Harriers GAA pitch. This was a huge success, and we will build on this in the future.



### **Coaching Projects 2022**

Our coaches in Wexford GAA were involved in many more initiatives off the field too. Below is a sample of just some of the outreach work that has been carried out.

- Active Aging- Pole Activation in association with Sports Active Wexford.
- Wexford GAA Fittest Schools was a huge success again. We had over 60 teams participating, and this year we had the privilege of having teams of students also.
- Wexford Wellbeing Programme 2022 had the theme of 'Positivity' including initiatives such as Kick to Touch and Puc for Positivity

### **Conclusion**

Finally, my sincere thanks to everyone that helped me during the year. To all my Coiste Bainistí members for your words of advice and support, all the full-time staff and the various committees who have done incredible work during the year. To both Mícheál Martin and John Kenny, a huge thanks for showing great leadership, as well as being so supportive, and for always having the best for Wexford GAA at heart. To Bobby Goff, for the guidance he gave me and always being available to help out. A huge thanks to Ray Harris, our Games Development Manager. The work that he, and all the aforementioned put in is incredible, not to mention their commitment and drive, and I know with Ray at the helm Wexford GAA Coaching Office we will continue to be a beacon of excellence.

As I step away from this role, I want to pay particular homage to all the volunteers I have encountered. From coaches to players and from gates people to club delegates. Whatever your role, you are the heartbeat of our organization. I have seen the passion that you all share for your football and hurling, and I know that if Wexford GAA is to progress we need to continue to harness that passion and move forward together. # Safety and Facilities Officers Report

### Introduction

In preparing the foregoing it is the inaugural report to be prepared by a Safety and Facilities Officer for Wexford GAA. This is due to the position of the Safety and Facilities Officer only coming into being in 2022 due to changes made at special congress in late 2021 to the GAA's Official Guide.

As defined by the GAA'S role description – The role of the Safety and Facilities Officer is to provide advice and support to the Clubs of the County and the County Committee on best practice in several key areas including Ground Health & Safety, Control of Property, Insurance and the development of Grounds and Facilities'.

As part of the rule changes made at special congress 2021 a 'Safety and Facilities Committee' must be established and chaired by the Safety and Facilities Officer to assist in the activities to be undertaken.

The GAA Planning and Officer Training department, based in Croke Park, held a Safety and Facilities Officer's induction on the 30th March 2022 via a 'Teams' meeting. At this induction the role of the Safety and Facilities Officer was outlined with the key areas of responsibilities identified and keynote speakers gave presentations of their specialised areas (such as Infrastructure finance, Health & Safety, Insurances, Sustainability).

The Key areas identified that the Safety and Facilities Officer and the Safety and Facilities Committee have responsibility for to give advice and offer assistance to clubs and the county committee were:

- Facilities & Infrastructure (advice and assistance to clubs on grounds and facility developments, loan application and approval process, grant applications)
- Property (advice and assistance on Trustee's and promote the GAA Corporate Trustee model for clubs)
- Insurance (advise and assist clubs on insurance required for infrastructure works)
- Sustainability
- Health & Safety

As Safety and Facilities Officer, I act as chairperson for the County Safety and Facilities Committee and liaise with the relevant personnel at Provincial Level, Central Level and with GAA Staff in Croke Park for advice, assistance and to implement various actions relating to the above areas of responsibility.

With the role of Safety and Facilities Officer being a new position in 2022 the role description, responsibilities and supports were not finalised at GAA Central Level and by Croke Park until mid-



2022. This did restrict activities and the implantation and roll out of information and supports to clubs and the county committee this year.

The position of the Safety & Facility Officer, under rule in the GAA's Official Guide, does not sit on the County Executive Committee. Advice from GAA Central Level advises that counties could decide through the counties by-laws to place the Safety & Facility Officer on the County Executive. Wexford GAA amended their by-Laws in 2022 to place the Safety and Facilities Officer on the County Executive Committee. In carrying out my duties as Safety and Facilities Officer I feel that the person acting in this position should be on the County Executive committee as they are responsible for areas that have a significant impact on the operations of both clubs and at county level.

Leinster GAA Planning & Physical Development Committee held an introduction meeting on 28th April 2022 in Leinster GAA Offices, Portlaoise. This meeting was attended by all Safety and Facilities Officer from Leinster. The meeting reviewed the role and responsibilities of the Safety and Facilities Officer as outlined previously in this report.

A further National Safety and Facilities Officers meeting was held on 29th September 2022 via 'Teams'. The main item on the agenda at the meeting was the introduction of the new GAA's National Health & Safety Officer, Patrick O'Brien.

In carrying out my duties as Safety and Facilities Officer in accordance with the responsibilities set out above additional responsibilities were undertaken due to Wexford GAA's ambitious infrastructure plans as set out in the Strategic Plan launched in 2021. Outlined in the following is a summary of the activities undertaken in the last 12 months in performing my role as Safety and Facilities Officer for Wexford GAA

### **Safety and Facilities Committee**

As outlined in the GAA's official Guide a Safety and Facilities Committee was formed for 2022. The following was the committee members:

- David Tobin (Chairperson)

An initial introduction meeting was held on 3rd March 2022 via 'Teams' and subsequent meetings and activities are outlined throughout this report.

The committees' activities in 2022 was restricted in some areas due to the role of the Safety and Facilities Officer being a new position in 2022 and information in relation to a role description, responsibilities and support information not issued from GAA central level until mid-2022.

### Health & Safety

At the Safety and Facilities Officers induction event a presentation was given by a member (Emma Kelly) of the GAA's National Health & Safety Committee in relation to Health & Safety initiatives. Outlined was a polit project called the 'Safe Club Initiative' held in a selected county (Monaghan) pre Covid by the GAA's National Health & Safety Committee. It is intended to expand the 'Safe Club Initiative' to other counties. The aim of the initiative is to get clubs to take a proactive approach to Health & Safety.

Any Wexford Clubs interested and willing to participate should contact myself.



Also presented was the GAA's National Health & Safety Committee's Strategic Plan in relation to Health & Safety it is intended that this document will act as an advisory resource to clubs and county committees in all areas relating to Health & Safety.

The overall aim of these health & safety initiatives is to reduce claims against the GAA's insurance cover which is resulting in increasing insurance premiums.

In relation to Health & Safety the Safety and Facilities Committee and the Safety & Facilities Officers responsibility are only to advise on the procedures, documentation and supports available from the various GAA units and not to act as a Health & Safety officer for clubs. It is clubs' responsibility to manage and implement Health & Safety matters in their grounds and facilities.

As outlined above the GAA have now appointed a National Health & Safety Officer as a member of the full-time staff, Patrick O'Brien was appointed to the role in September 2022.

### **Event Control and Management**

Event Control and Management forms part of the responsibilities of the Safety and Facilities Committee. An Event Controller is required at all games with attendances more than 5,000. Bobby Goff acts as Event Controller for all games in Wexford Park and is assisted by many on big match days. On big match days is Wexford Park a significant number of Stewards are required to carry out duties to have safe operations during the event/games. Steward numbers are currently low in Wexford GAA and a steward training course will be held in January 2023 for all existing and new stewards. For big games to continue in Wexford Park a significant number of additional/new stewards will be required. Any person interested in becoming a steward should contact the Wexford Park Office.

### *Insurances*

At the Safety and Facilities Officers induction event presentation was given by a member (Sinead Leavy) of the GAA's insurance department in relation to insurances and claims.

Advised was that claim pay-outs are increasing year on year with over two thirds of the pay-outs relating to non-GAA activity (with the exception being during COVID 19 when facilities were not being used).

Advice was given in relation to clubs that have third party organisations using club facilities. These clubs should inform the Croke Park insurance department of these activities, and the third-party organisations should have their own insurance cover.

An issue has arisen again this year in that some clubs undertaking infrastructure works (building/construction works) are not informing the Croke Park insurance department (Sinead Leavy / Ciara Clarke) that works are to be carried out. Clubs and county committee must inform the Croke Park insurance department of the works being undertaken and issue the relevant insurances from the contractors. Failure to do so has or may result in the facilities constructed not being covered by the property insurance cover.

### Sustainability

The GAA's Sustainability Manager, Jimmy Darcy, presented the GAA's sustainability programme at the Safety and Facilities Officer induction event. A 'Green Club' initiative has been set up and polit projects have been undertaken since 2021. The aim of the 'Green Club' initiative is to provide a tool-kit with practical case studies and expert advice for clubs and county committees to utilise.

Wexford GAA are in the process of setting up an expert committee in this area and a presentation will be presented at Convention outlining the programme.



Any Wexford GAA Clubs interested and willing to participate should contact myself.

Grant funding can be available for sustainability and energy upgrade works via the SAEI.

### Infrastructure

The following was undertaken in relation to Infrastructure during 2022:

### County Development

### Halo Tiles Wexford GAA Centre of Excellence

A sub-committee was formed to carry out duties for the proposed developments at Halo Tiles COE, the committee members for 2022 were:

- Wally Byrne
- Anthony Neville
- Bobby Goff
- David Tobin

### Planning Application

- Following receipt from An Bord Pleanála in November 2021 of a decision to refuse planning for the new entrance and additional pitches. Meetings were held with the Local Authority to review the project in relation to options for a redesign and new application.
- Consultation was held with local neighbours to agree and resolve any issues to allow a new planning application.
- Agreement was made to carry out works to the boundary of the site with the planting of hawthorn hedging. This work was carried out in January 2022 by Michael Eustace (AskmeLandscaping)
- A new Planning application was prepared for the project. A partial redesign was required for the new application and several meetings were held with the design team to agree the changes in the months of January, February and March. The new application was lodged in March 2022.
- Final Grant of Planning was received from Wexford County Council in June 2022

### Overhead Power Lines

- Following the installation of the underground ducting in November 2021. The ESB were on site in the months of May and June to remove the overhead lines and place underground. The lines were removed in June leaving the site clear to install the three new playing pitches.
- It must be noted that the removal of these overhead lines was completed at minimal cost to Wexford GAA, with only the civil works to place the underground ducting a cost. Wexford GAA would not have been able to consider removal of these power lines without the prior agreement that was made by former County Board Chairman, Ger Doyle, with ESB Networks in the late 00's.
- Thanks to David Ormonde and Wally Byrne for the work in getting the project complete, both liaised with ESB Networks. Thanks to Seamus O'Brien who looked after ESB Networks on site with access and a compound area. Thanks to John Morris, Bobby Goff, Kevin Kehoe and his workers in getting the project complete.

### Pitch Works Development

- Following receipt of the Final Grant of Planning and the removal of the overhead power line in June 2022 the project could move to construction stage.
- A Contract was agreed with Martin Kehoe Plant Hire Ltd to construct the 3nr. new playing pitches to the same specification of the existing pitches in Halo Tiles COE. The Contract amount is circa €570k including VAT. The contract includes for the installation of ducting for floodlights to the 3 nr. pitches.



- To agree a contract and commence on site significant detailed design works was carried out
  with site surveys complete, detailed drawings and specifications prepared, all relevant Health
  & Safety and Statutory requirements fulfilled.
- Construction works commenced in September 2022 and pitches are programmed to be seeded in late spring 2023 for use in late Autumn / Winter 2023.

### **Building Extension**

- Completion of the additional 3 nr. new pitches will result in 7 nr. pitches in the centre of
  excellence. Currently there are 4 nr. dressing rooms on site which at present is not adequate.
  With the additional pitches and Ladies associations coming on board the additional dressing
  rooms will be required.
- The process to prepare a Design and a Planning Application for an extension to the existing building has commenced. With the procurement of a design team in process. It is programmed to have an application lodged in early 2023 to allow an application for a future sports capital grant application.

### Pitches & Venue Facilities

- The pitches and facilities at the venue were kept in pristine condition at all times during the
  year by Seamus O'Brien his scheme worker (Derek Kearns) and now also by John (Bumpy)
  Nolan, thanks to all who have contributed to the process.
- John Kehoe, Wexford GAA Head Groundsman & Facilities Manager, now has an involvement in the venue but will have little worry with the job the men on site are carrying out.
- Only minor maintenance was required to the surface of the access road in 2022 and it has been in good condition all year.
- Annual pitch maintenance was carried out in spring 2022 with sand topdressing, verti draining and some overseeding carried out.

### **Sports Capital Funding**

• Sport Capital grant allocation granted in 2015, the drawdown process is ongoing and in the final stages of the process. Thanks to Cathal Byrne who is managing the drawdown process and hopefully funds will be released soon.

### Wexford Camogie & LGFA

- As outlined by Micheál Martin, County Chairman, engagement had been made in 2021 with the Wexford LGFA & Wexford Camogie Association in relation to involvement in the Halo Tiles COE expansion. LGFA were in agreement to be part of the plan in 2021.
- In 2022 meetings were held with Wexford LGFA and Wexford Camogie that I attended as Safety and Facilities Officer and Chairperson of the proposed development.
- It must be noted the when the planning application design drawings were being drafted in 2020 it was only intended to install 2 nr. new pitches at the Centre of Excellence. It gives me great pleasure now to know that the time and effort I volunteered to review the design and fit 3 nr. pitches into the expansion plans will now see a centre for all in the county.

### Chadwick's Wexford Park

A sub-committee was formed to carry out duties for the proposed developments at Wexford Park, committee members were given specific sections of the proposed development works to be responsible for. The committee members for 2022 were:

- David Ormonde (pitchworks)
- Ibar Murphy (pitchworks)
- Bobby Goff (pitchworks)
- Derek Kent (Floodlighting)
- Owen Leacy (Building)
- David Tobin (Chairperson of all works)

### Pitchworks

• A scope of works was agreed to be carried out on the pitch following review of specialist report prepared by an Agronomist.



- The agreed scope of works included the following: installation of full pop-up irrigation system to the pitch, install Astro turf strip to the pitch side line at the dug-outs and over-seeding/sand dressing/maintenance works to the pitch surface.
- The programme for the works was agreed as following: commence works in May 2022 and complete in August 2022 with the pitch reopening for club championship games.
- Tender documents were prepared and issued for the irrigation system by Hayden Turf Care. Tender returns were received in April 2022.
- TSPI Ltd (Tim Collins) was appointed as the Main contractor for the irrigation works in May 2022.
- Works commenced in May 2022 and were completed in August 2022 on time for club games.
- Works comprised irrigation pipework installed to the perimeter of the pitch in the gravel track, irrigation pipework installed in the pitch by a minimal invasive method by stripping the topsoil in rolls for re-laying, 31nr. Sprinkler heads installed, perforated drainage pipe and pea gravel surround installed to all pitch pipework trenches, floodlight ducting installed to pitch perimeter trench, 3 nr. underground water storage tanks with total volume of 95 cubic meters, new well drilled and control room with controls.
- TSPI Ltd (Tim Collins) was the main contractor, however several local Wexford subcontractors
  were used by TSPI Ltd on the project mainly Gary Flood Landscapes for all civil works and
  O'Rourke Well drilling.
- Sole Sports and Leisure Ltd installed the Astro turf to the side-line
- Total spend on the Works was circa €235k including VAT.
- During the works significant time was inputted from Wexford GAA volunteers who managed
  the project during that very busy two months. Thanks to Bobby Goff and David Ormonde for
  the time invested and the lunch time meetings we had. Also, thanks to John Kehoe and the
  staff in Wexford Park for their involvement.



### Floodlighting

- Tender documents were prepared and issued for the floodlighting by G-MECH SERVICES LTD. Tender returns were received in May 2022.
- Following receipt of the tenders a programme of works for the proposed installation was established. It was agreed that the floodlighting would be installed and commissioned by the end of January 2023 with no works commencing on site until after club games were finished in late October 2022.
- MUSCO Lighting were appointed for the supply and installation of the floodlighting installation in July 2022 for the sum of circa €530k including VAT. The scope of works excluded column bases, ducting connections and concourse lighting.
- From date of order and payment of deposit MUSCO required a 14-week manufacture and delivery period of light columns and fittings.
- A site investigation was carried out to establish ground conditions for the column bases, this resulted in pile foundations required due to the poor ground conditions.
- Works commenced on the column bases in early November 2022 and bases were complete by the end of November 2022.
- MUSCO columns and fittings arrived on site week ending 25th November 2022 and works to assemble the fittings and columns has commenced.
- Lighting columns will be erected in mid December 2022
- Floodlighting installation will be commissioned in January 2023 ready for the opening night on the 21st January 2023
- Concourse lighting has been designed by G-MECH SERVICES LTD. and works are to commence on site December 2022.
- The floodlighting installation comprise of 4 nr. columns placed off each corner of the pitch circa 35 metres high, LED light fittings, 1000 lux installation, dimmer controls and special 'light show' controls. Lights will be powered by a generator.
- Total anticipated costs for the project will be in the region of circa €850 900k including VAT.
   Works are currently ongoing on site at the time of preparing this report. These costs include for floodlighting installation complete with civils works, concourse light and generator.
- Thanks to Derek Kent who has project managed the project for Wexford GAA (as a volunteer)
  and it gives me great pleasure that Derek accepted this role as it was Derek's initial idea to
  install the floodlighting.

### Dressing Room Extension & Press Box & Disabled Area

- In the scope of works in which the Grant of Planning was received in 2021 it included for extension to the existing dressing rooms, reconfiguration of the press areas and installation of a disabled toilet at first floor level at the disabled area in the stand.
- A decision was made to defer these works pending funding application through the IIP application.
- Toilets to the disabled area in the stand at first floor level is a priority and should be addressed in 2023.
- An Energy Audit has been complete for Wexford Park which is one of the initial steps in making a grant application for works under a SAEI grant.

### Pitch & Venue Facilities maintenance

- John Kehoe was hired as the new Head Groundsman & Facilities Manager by Wexford GAA in 2022 and John has continued the excellent upkeep of the grounds this year.
- Pitch maintenance was carried out as part of the irrigation installation but additional works were carried out in early 2022 for the intercounty season and regular maintenance continued throughout the year.



• The stadium is now maintained by John Kehoe and his team of workers (John Nolan, scheme man John Shiel and other scheme men). It must be noted that Bobby Goff and David Ormonde have volunteered many hours of their free time to assist in the efforts to maintain and monitor the stadium. Special thanks to David Ormonde who is available at any time needed to assist in any matters or issues in the stadium, his efforts have been especially helpfully during the current year when significant infrastructure works have been carried out in the stadium.

### St Patricks Park

A sub-committee was formed to carry out duties for the proposed developments at St Patricks Park. The committee members for 2022 were :

### Health & Safety Works

- Following issues raised at County Board meetings by delegates in relation to Health & Safety issues at the venue. A safety inspection audit was carried out by members of the Safety and Facilities Committee. This audit identified immediate hazards to be addressed.
- A scope of works was agreed to be carried out in relation to the safety inspection. Works
  consisted of the following: removal of organic growth and debris from the spectator banks,
  stone blinding installed to spectator banks, fencing to rear of spectator bank at laneway,
  removal of overgrowth to stand side and hardcore blinding to areas, concrete plinth to stand,
  clean to rear of goal and reducing the tree heights at the rear of the goal.
- Tender documents were prepared and issued to contractors. Tenders were received in April 2022.
- Dermot Neville was appointed for the safety works and works were carried out in April 2022.
- APB Treecare carried out the works to reduce the tree heights to the rear of the goals.
- Willie Power installed the fencing to the spectator bank
- All works carried out resulted in a total spend of circa €45k including VAT.
- I would like to thank all the St Patrick Park committee members above who managed the works on site when being carried out, they volunteered their free time to ensure the project was completed.

### Dressing Rooms and Floodlights

- There are issues at the venue with the dressing room facilities with water supply and the shower systems in urgent need of upgrade.
- An Energy Audit was carried out in 2022 by a specialist consultant as part of the process to seek grant aid through a SAEI grant for upgrade of the lighting systems and the dressing rooms facilities. This process to seek this grant aid has proven to be slow and frustrating.

### Pitch & Venue Facilities maintenance

- Thanks to Michael Lynch, the Lynch family and many others for their contribution to having the venue always available to host games or training.
- It should be noted that the pitch at St Patricks Park is exceptional as it hosts more games than most pitches and is always playable in the most extreme weather conditions.
- An issue has occurred in the last month in relation to access to the venue.

### Strategic Plan

The Strategic Plan launched in 2021 outlined ambitious infrastructures plans, outlined below is an update on progress on the delivery of these projects:

- Chadwicks Wexford Park Irrigation installation complete in 2022
- Chadwicks Wexford Park Floodlighting installation in progress, completion January 2023
- Chadwicks Wexford Park Dressing room extension and Press area/disabled area upgrade, awaiting IIP decision on application made in 2022
- St Patricks Park Health & Safety works complete in 2022
- St Patricks Park Dressing Room & Floodlight upgrade grant application pending in 2022
- Halo Tiles COE Planning lodged and final grant received for new entrance and pitches in 2022
- Halo Tiles COE Pitch works commenced in 2022, completion Summer 2023
- Halo Tiles COE Building Extension : design and planning application preparation in progress in 2022

Challenges exist in delivering the aims set out under infrastructure in the strategic plan. Challenges include funding requirements, Planning and the current pressures on the construction industry where price inflation is a major issue.

### Funding / Grant Applications

Funding and Grant applications are available from various sources and applications have been mainly worked on by Micheál Martin, David Tobin and Gavin O'Donovan.

### Croke Park Funding

- A presentation was made to the GAA's National Infrastructure committee on the 19th July 2022 via a 'Teams' meeting. The meeting outlined the proposed infrastructure works in the Strategic Plan. The meeting was attended by Micheál Martin, David Tobin and Gavin O'Donovan.
- Croke Park announced infrastructure grants for up to €250,000 for immediate infrastructure
  works to be carried out. An application process was open in September 2022 and Wexford
  GAA applied for funds based on the Wexford Park project. The application was complete by
  an online application by David Tobin assisted by Gavin O'Donovan.
- Wexford GAA were successful with the grant application and received €200,000.

### **Sports Capital Funding**

- A meeting was held with the Sport Minister, Jack Chambers, in the Centre or Excellence in the Summer of 2022 where Wexford GAA made a presentation of their plans for the expansion of the Centre of Excellence.
- It is not known when the next application process will be open for sports capital funding both regional applications and Large-Scale applications. It is planned to have a planning application lodged for the building extension in the Centre of Excellence to allow a grant application be made for the project either Regional or Large-scale application when the process opens.

### **SAEI Funding**

- As outlined previous this avenue of funding is being explored in St Patricks Park with initial steps in the process complete by Wexford GAA by registering with SAEI, Energy Audit complete and application in process.
- An Energy Audit has also been completed for Wexford Park.
- Grant funding is available for energy upgrade works up to a maximum of 50% of the capital cost of a project. Wexford GAA are setting up a special committee to explore Sustainability and this scheme may be utilised in any project identified. A presentation is to be made at county convention in relation to sustainability.

Immigrant Investor Programme (IIP) Funding



- Included in last year's Development Officers report was an item in relation to IIP funding application for the Centre of Excellence and that due to the refused grant of Planning that a significant funding opportunity was lost by Wexford GAA. In the 12 months since convention last year this funding scheme has got significant national publicity especially in the last six months with some high-profile projects receiving funding. This scheme has been a well-guarded secret by many in recent years.
- In early 2021 Micheál Martin and I began the process of compiling an application for the Centre of Excellence project. Significant hours were invested preparing the business plan and meetings with the agent and authorities on the process and application.
- Following the refused Planning in the Centre of Excellence an application was immediately prepared for the Wexford Park project and an application made by the necessary process. This application is going through the necessary procedures and late 2022 or early 2023 results will be known how successful the process has been.
- It must noted that Wexford GAA would not be in the advanced position of an IIP application without the significant input of a member of the Wexford GAA wider community and thanks to them.

### Wexford GAA Audit and Risk Committee

Meetings have been held with the Wexford GAA Audit and Risk Committee to outline the
process of procuring and carrying out the infrastructure works and answer and questions the
committee have in relation to the projects.

### Club Development

### Leinster GAA

- Leinster Club Infrastructure Development committee interaction was limited with one meeting being held with the committee in 2022.
- Leinster GAA grant funding was limited to projects completed pre-covid and Leinster GAA have selected projects that will receive minor grant aid.
- Leinster GAA informed that grant funding for 2023 is pending and no decision will be made until next year.

### Club Loan Applications

- All club loans over €15,000 require various levels of approval from the units within the GAA structures. It is the responsibility of the Safety and Facilities Officer to review the approval applications from clubs and bring to the county committee for assessment and approval. All of the below applications were reviewed during the year and assistance was given where needed.
- The GAA Development Fund was opened for loan application in 2022 with the following Wexford Clubs making applications:
  - Ferns St Aidan's
  - o Davidstown Courtnacuddy
  - Kilmore
  - St James
  - Sarsfields
- Applications for approval to borrow from financial institutions was made by the following clubs:
  - Geraldine O'Hanrahans
  - Shamrocks
  - St Josephs
- Several clubs engaged for advice on various planned infrastructure projects proposed to club grounds. Projects were varied and ranged from concept design stage to construction completion.



### Conclusion

In conclusion I will be the first person to serve Wexford GAA in the role of Safety and Facilities Officer and it has been a great honour to do so. It has been an extremely busy year with the infrastructure works being undertaken by Wexford GAA adding a significant workload to the role. Hours of unseen works are input with the end results taking time to be seen. The volunteered free time given by many people associated with Wexford GAA has been of great assistance to me during the year. The expertise given has saved Wexford GAA significant amounts and reduced costs on projects being delivered. However, it must be noted that the volunteer is a dying bread in the GAA and I hope the GAA act to keep these people who keep the organisation alive. As seen in my report projects are being delivered at county level by Wexford GAA and works should continue pending funding availability. With the split season at national level with intercounty fixtures complete in the first half of the year it now results in all intercounty teams preparing for their season from late November and in the winter months. This means floodlight training pitches are needed for all intercounty teams to prepare and with only two pitches lit in the centre of excellence and St Patricks Park pressure on the pitches is extreme. Clubs continue to develop and expand facilities within the county to provide the facilities needed to cater for the needs of their members resulting in Wexford Clubs having some of the best facilities in the country.

Thanks to all committee members, members of management, Wexford GAA staff, CEO/Operations Manager, the County Secretary, the County Chairman, clubs and individuals for their assistance during the year.

### **Games Programme**

The programme of underage commenced in March with minimal disruption throughout the year. As a committee, we would like to thank those who work so hard at scheduling our games for their huge commitment and great effort in organising such an extensive calendar of games. We have had an extremely successful year with 312 teams participating at various age levels and over 1000 games played. 95% of scheduled games were played. We also saw a surge of clubs introducing a nursery.

### **Discipline**

As we can see from the table below there has been an increase in Category 3 incidents as it has doubled from the previous year however, we can see that Category 4/5 has had a significant decrease in incidents. This year has however highlighted that there is an issue with side-line behaviour towards officials and to a lesser extent towards opposing players. This year also saw all 49 clubs in Wexford take part in a Referees Workshop and the introduction of the 'Give Respect, Get Respect' handshake with referees and players before games. Since the workshops were conducted there has been a significant drop in complaints from referees. Clubs need to continue to be more proactive on discipline and build a culture of self-discipline by education of mentors, coaches, players and even supporters of their responsibilities when at games and coaching teams.

### Refereeing

There are 79 registered referees in Wexford of which 50 were available for use in the games programme. We as a committee are extremely grateful for the service these people provide as without them the games programme would not be possible.

There is continued focus on the recruitment of new referees. Expanding the numbers should be a priority to reduce the burden and pressures on the current resources. The refereeing resources Coiste have to utilise are the same people that adult, camogie, LGFA and other sports utilise.

Again, we need to emphasise the importance of 'Give Respect, Get Respect'. This problem was more evident at the younger age groups especially at the U13 age group. Bad behaviour was not only from team mentors but also from supporters attending these games.
